## Festivals Galore



Celebrations everywhere, fruits & flowers in abundance, special poojas offered to the deities in the temples, various culinary delights, people wearing colourful costumes, tiny tots enjoying the holiday bemused with all the traditional rituals that's going on in their home, excitement & merriment...festive season is really upon us.

The beginning of Shravana in the Hindu calendar marks various festivals lined up to be celebrated with happiness & glee. As a child, I remember my grandparents celebrating the festivals very traditionally. The prepping on the eve of the festival by shopping for flowers, fruits & other pooja items, tying toranas for all the doors, decorating the mantapam, was the most enjoyable part. Early morning abyanjana baths, huge rangolis in front of the gate & in front of the kitchen stove, the aromatic sumptuous "Naivedyam" dishes prepared as an offering to the deity for which we children used to wait restlessly to relish, new dresses, the pooja Itself & then the serving of the lunch in an orderly manner on a banana leaf. The early evenings, when guests started to arrive for haldi kumkum, are some of the sweet memories that I can never forget. I also remember how our elders insisted us to clean up after the festivities which we were not very keen on, but that was a disciplinary action we had to follow. Now that I am an adult, (or am I?) I get them. We children used to have a lot of fun, but I think our elders were more concerned about following every ritual to the tee as set up by their ancestors. Over the years, many changes have been adopted in the observance of the festivals according to our convenience & mindset. I'm not saying its wrong, changes are welcome, after all Change is the only constant in the world. Instead of practising some prejudiced customs which are accompanied by fear & guilt, people should enjoy the spirit of the festival. Well, let me not get into controversial matters here, the baseline is to preserve our culture & practice it for our next generation to follow, not just because of religious beliefs but because it gives depth to our moral values & attitudes & helps the society to practice sinless behaviour, which I would say is the need of the hour.

We have already performed "ಗಂಡನ ಪೂಜೆ ", you know what I mean - Jyothibhimeshwara pooje, Nagapanchami, Varamahalakshmi Vrat, Sri Krishna Janmashtami, Gowri Ganesh habba & a number of other festivals. Next is the much awaited Nadahabba Dasara which is just around the corner. The whole city will be lit up with colourful lights giving the vibe of a 'Fairyland'. Chinnara dasara, yuva dasara, kaigarika dasara, chitrakala mela, food mela, film festival, music & dance concerts, dramas, competitions, flower shows, navaratri doll shows, artefacts, you name it, everything is covered during this festival! The cynosure of eyes, both India and abroad will definitely be the 750kg Golden Howdah or the Chinnada Ambaari, which will be on display in the



palace. We have welcomed the majestic herd of elephants, "The Gaja Pade", to our city. Intense training sessions & rehearsals have been going on with them to carry the Golden Howdah in which Goddess Chamundeshwari will be seated on the last day of the festivities for the Vishwavikhyatha

Jumboo Savari. All eyes will be on the elephant carrying the howdah. Tens of thousands of people crowd all along the procession route to catch a wonderful glimpse of the parade.

All the energy, creativity, enthusiasm surrounding our festivals is because of the passion we have towards our culture. Passion speaks to us, guides us & we obey.
